Clean Up Australia Day in Guilderton

The Guilderton Community Association would like to thank all the volunteers who contributed towards a very successful Clean Up in Guilderton on Clean Up Australia Day March 6th 2016.

We had 63 volunteers across 5 sites – the river, foreshore, Groyne, Silver Creek, and Guilderton Road (from Indian Ocean into the town). We counted 99 filled rubbish bags, and as much again in bulk, comprising timber, polythene sheeting, plastic piping and carpet, most of which came from the river. It's upsetting to think that some people consider our beautiful river a dumping ground for unwanted waste.

On the plus side, the overall rubbish collected was less than that of previous years, which reflects the success of the Clean Up campaigns over the years, and also the litter conscientious shire gardeners and residents who habitually pick up litter.



Volunteers joined us at the Guilderton Country Club, after the hard work, to relax and socialise over a sausage sizzle followed by chocolate brownies and water melon. Michael Aspinall, Chair of Keep Australia Beautiful(WA), and Shire of Gingin Councillor, joined us with his family to participate in the Clean Up. Michael and GCA President Dean Brady, both gave a short speech and presented Clean Up Certificates to the Beldon Scouts and members of the Gingin Scouts who assisted with the river clean up.



We would particularly like to thank the Shire of Gingin for organising the skip bin and allowing special dispensation to the Beldon Scouts to camp at Silver Creek, the Beldon Scouts who have taken responsibility for cleaning up an extended area around Silver Creek for the last 8 years or so, the Guilderton Country Club for their assistance with the Sausage Sizzle, members of the Gingin Scouts who helped with the river clean up and all the individual volunteers. Health Services in the Lower Coastal Region

Our local member, Shane Love MLA, attended the Lower Coastal Community Association Meeting in Guilderton recently and brought us up to date with changes to health care services in country regions. Shane is well aware of the woeful lack of health services in the coastal communities, inclusive of after hospital transport to hospital for care. appointments, and late life care, and has been working for several years to try and reverse this situation.

Shane has had meetings with the former health minister, Kim Haynes, the present health minister, John Day, Terry Redman MLA and Martin Aldridge MLC. They realise that bringing services from Northam is not working, nor is the practice of re-enforcing old patterns of services, such as increasing the sizes of hospitals already established. Studies have been made to bring an appropriate level of health services to all coastal communities between Jurien and the Wanneroo boundary.

The GCA recognises the need for Meals on Wheels in Guilderton, amongst other needs, and invites expressions of interest from persons willing to volunteer their time to provide these services, until such time as a more formal arrangement is available.

The Club could possibly make the club kitchen available at appropriate times.

Friends of Moore River Estuary NACC conducted the second water quality monitoring testing of the estuary on May 6th. We are testing 5 sites; the mouth, before Silver Creek, at Diamond Island, before Woodridge boat ramp and up by the last navigable bend. In May and November we use the Pro Plus meter and in February and August. The information is being recorded for future comparisons as well as to see any immediate problems. The Shire is responsible for microbial testing to be sure the water is safe to swim in, this is a separate issue.

AGM in April and welcome membership and renewals from anyone interested in our activities. Cost is \$20 per family.

The FOMRE website contains lots of information on our purpose and actions, Photomon, ACORN (measurement of sea surface currents using land based high frequency radar) and water monitoring. Many thanks to Gillian Lamont for collating and displaying FOMRE's various activities on the web.
